pastor's letter

Thoughts from Pastor Alex ...

In the fourth century A.D., there lived a man who was such a gifted preacher of the holy gospel that he was known as John "Golden Mouth", or John Chrysostom. This is how he began his sermon on Easter: "Enter all of you, therefore, into the joy of our Lord, and, whether first or last, receive your reward. O rich and poor, one with another, dance for joy! O you ascetics and you negligent, celebrate the day! You that have fasted and you that have disregarded the fast, rejoice today! The table is rich-laden: feast royally, all of you! The calf is fatted: let no one go forth hungry! Let all partake of the feast of faith."

Maybe you've fasted this Lenten season as an expression of your love for the Lord, your longing for the distance between you to be reduced, and your prayer that your fellowship might be all the sweeter. This is what the season of Lent is all about. But maybe you're one who has disregarded this season of fasting. Maybe you haven't made any special effort to draw closer to the Lord who gave you life, and who gave his life for you. The good news is this: even if this describes you, even if you haven't sought the Lord in a special way this Lenten season, the Lord still loves you. And he still invites you to celebrate the gift of his grace this Easter Sunday.

You're invited to celebrate because Easter is not about your performance as a Christian; it's not about how well you are seeking the Lord and serving him. You're invited to celebrate because Easter is all about what God has done for you. The Lord Jesus Christ was condemned, tortured, and crucified on our behalf, so that all our wrongdoings have been paid in full by his suffering, so that we might be found "not guilty" in God's eyes, and be free from all punishment our wrongdoings merited. But being found "not guilty" and being punishment-free are not the only gifts of Easter. Jesus also clothes us with his righteousness, so that when God the Father looks at us, he sees us robed with the perfection of Jesus Christ, and his heart is filled with perfect love for us. But being seen as righteous and being loved by God still aren't the only gifts of Easter. The best gift of all, is that Jesus Christ, the love of our life, has been raised from the dead. His life and love fill our hearts with peace and joy and with great hope. One day, just as he has promised us, we who comprise his beloved church, will be reunited with him in festal joy, as great as the joy of a bride and groom on their wedding day, and we will indeed live together happily ever after, never again to part.

May your hearts be filled with God's grace, peace, hope, and joy this Easter Season!

preschool corner

Is spring really here?? In the preschool room it is! We spent the month of March talking about different aspects of spring. The first week we talked about the more general signs and activities of spring. The older children made three-dimensional (3-D) umbrellas with paper plates and dot markers, and added raindrops with string and blue paper. The younger group made frog puppets with tissue paper, paper plates and egg carton eyes! (We love to recycle!) We had real birds' nests and a hornet's nest (thank you, Jim Grieser!) at the Science Table, and we learned that the hornet's nest is made from hornet saliva and wood pulp! We also started a worm farm in the Science area, and most of us LOVED touching the worms before we introduced them to their new home. We learned that worms are helpful, since they break up the soil for roots to grow. They like to eat tissues (!), newspaper, and fruit and vegetable scraps, but not oranges or lemons. The second week we focused on things that grow in the spring. We compared different types of seeds and sorted them in the Math Area, and also guessed what types of fruits and vegetables would grow from those seeds. We planted Forget-Me-Not flower seeds, and are anxiously waiting for them to sprout. We had "St. John's Flower Shop" in the Dramatic Play area, and the children enjoyed using vases to arrange the flowers for sale. In the Sensory Table, we had real dirt with flower pots, artificial flowers and shovels. We focused on bugs and butterflies during the third week of the month. We used a symmetrical painting technique to make beautiful butterflies in the Tuesday-Thursday classes, and the Monday-Wednesday-Friday classes learned about the butterfly life cycle and the parts of an insect. The Science table contained a 3-D bug book and 2 cases of mounted butterflies. God is truly an amazing artist! We mounted (pretend) ladybugs onto popsicle sticks at the Fine Motor table, and made patterns with rubber bugs at the Math Center. The last week of the month was Spring Break and we were able to spend time with our families. For a short month, it was a very busy one!

One new thing we are doing on campus this semester is offering a free English club to Brazilian students. The English language is a very valuable skill for Brazilians; if they can learn to speak in English it opens up new opportunities for education, work and travel.

We are hosting teams from Michigan State and Ohio State here in Brazil this month during their spring breaks from classes. They are visiting to help us build new relationships with students, and to gain a taste of Brazil so they can return to their campuses and invite others to pray for and consider coming to Florianopolis for a month-long or year-long ministry trip.

Through our new English club and hosting the teams from MSU and OSU, we got to meet new students, like Gaspar, a freshman student from Angola, who seems eager to learn English. Mission Experiences:

In Ephesians 2:8-10 Paul teaches 1) how it is by our faith in Jesus Christ that we are saved, not by the works that we do, and 2) we are created to do good works. Doing good works will not save us, but because we believe in Jesus as our Lord, we are called to follow his example of doing good for others. In part, Jesus teaches of this truth through the Parable of the Sheep and the Goats in Matthew 25:31-46.

I (Pastor Erich) first learned about faith and works while on a mission trip to the Uplands Retirement Center in Crossville, Tennessee, when I was a high school sophomore. Adult leaders on that trip were Jerry & Bonnie Faurote (one of Bonnie's brothers is Tom Johnson!) and Rev. Ed Lopeman. I got to work alongside Rev. Ed several times that week and while we washed windows and tended landscaping, he talked with me about faith and works and Jesus and faith and works and Jesus – we had much time together! I remain very grateful for his mentoring!

St. John's continues to offer several experiences each year that provide opportunities for people to learn and teach about faith and works and Jesus. These experiences include interactions with nearby Toledo Gospel Rescue Mission, Habitat for Humanity of Fulton County, FISH, to name a few. At a distance we travel to LaPorte County Habitat for Humanity and Back Bay Mission, as well as the summer SYF trip, and occasionally oversees to places like Kenya and India.

Each experience provides an opportunity to explore faith and works and Jesus, in a context of Christian fellowship and ministry.

October 7-14, 2017 – Back Bay Mission Trip to Biloxi, Mississippi:

Craig Steenkamp, the staff person in charge of the home restoration and construction program, is hoping that BBM will be ready to build two new houses come October, counting on SJCC volunteers to frame the walls of the two houses in a week's time! We'll need many hands for this endeavor!

April Mission-A-Month - Foods Resource Bank:

Foods Resource Bank (FRB), a Christian response to world hunger, was organized in 1999 to help provide the resources needed to support smallholder, agricultural food security programs in some of the world's poorest villages.

FRB does not ship grain or food overseas. Rather, they assist smallholder farmers and communities in the developing world with seeds, animals, tools, instruction, water supply - whatever is needed to produce ample food to feed themselves and their families, with enough left over to share, barter or sell to purchase staples, basic medicines, and send their children to school.

April gives us an opportunity to donate toward the planting, tending and harvesting of the community growing project we help sponsor in cooperation with the Church of the United Brethren and First Lutheran Church (both of Stryker). The fifteen acre field of beans/corn will be planted at the corner of St. Rt. 34 and Co. Rd. 22.75, southeast of Stryker. At harvest time, the crop will be sold and the proceeds given to FRB.



Bells and Chimes play at 10:30 worship service on Sunday, April 9 (Palm Sunday), and Junior Choir sings at 10:30 worship service on Sunday, April 30.

JYF (Junior Youth Fellowship) – Last month we enjoyed a Friends' night playing Bingo and winning prizes, and we enjoyed our Congregational Movie Night where we ate pizza from Marco's and watched the feature movie, God's Not Dead 2, a movie about living out our faith in God and not being afraid to share with others the good news of what Jesus has done for us. April is the last month of LOGOS and JYF for the Spring and we will be studying 1 John in class together, and we'll be looking forward to the JYF trip to the Toby Mac Concert on April 6, and looking forward to sponsoring St. John's annual Easter egg hunt!

Community Meal Ministry:

Back in 2010, when the Archbold Area Ministerial Association envisioned this ministry, they did so with this vision in mind: To provide a community minded ministry that strives to connect people, be a Christian witness of God's love, and witness to the unity of local churches serving in partnership with each other.

Yet there is an awareness that many people believe that these meals are meant for those who need just the food – their weekly budget needs to be supplemented by these meals. While it is true that the meals do help stretch a person's or a couple's or a family's food budget, it is so very evident that these meals offer a weekly opportunity for company and fellowship.

One way the kitchen crew has taken notice of the growing sense of fellowship is how slowly the dirty plates come back to the kitchen for washing – people are taking longer to eat their meals, enjoying table fellowship! While we joke about the slowness of the washing process, we praise God for the blessing of fellowship and table conversations!

An additional awareness is that more people could benefit from enjoying these meals — maybe you know of someone you could invite, pick up, and bring to the meals with you!

A Seder Meal will be observed on this night. At the Last Supper, Jesus celebrated the Jewish Passover with his disciples and instituted the sacrament of communion. The Seder Meal is a reenactment of the Passover meal, an annual memorial meal filled with great symbolism of God's faithful ass

faithfulness.

People are invited to gather in the Parish Hall at 6:30PM, sitting at tables specially set for this symbolic feast. The Seder is a festival meal in which everyone present will be involved in reading, listening, singing and eating! The hope is that some of the excitement and awe of the first Passover in Egypt and the Passover Seder in the upper room in Jerusalem will be felt by all.

Capital Campaign Committee:

A Reminder of How Our "Imagine Your Faith Building" Campaign Came To Be

A Lesson from the Past

It was in 1945 that the consistory of St. John's Church recommended to the congregation that the deacons be authorized to gather funds to enlarge the church. From this recommendation the congregation moved forward until on April 22, 1947 it was voted to build a new church. In 1949 the congregation acquired as a gift a three acre tract of land for the purpose of building a new church. From 1948 to 1952 over \$110,000 was raised for the new church building. A ground breaking service was held on November 27, 1955. On July 7, 1957 the St. John's congregation dedicated the present building. Basic plans of the building were to provide good dry classrooms with plenty of daylight and to eliminate the necessity of climbing a flight of stairs to enter the sanctuary. A note burning service was held on July 5, 1962. On July 5, 1964 a ground breaking service was held for the fellowship hall, kitchen and chapel, with this addition being dedicated on November 28, 1965. A mortgage burning service was held on November 29, 1970. The cost of the present building was approximately \$500,000, roughly \$2.4 million in today's dollars.

The Process Which Brought About Our Current Capital Campaign

- 1. It was in the late 1990's that the Long Range Planning Committee (LRPC) was formed to evaluate programmatic and physical needs of the church, following attention of the Property Committee to various building needs.
- 2. In 2001, a Facility Committee addressed needs identified by Long Range Planning Committee.
- 3. In 2003 the Facility Committee's proposed building plan failed to receive congregational approval; tally was 185 votes against the proposal and 142 votes in favor of the proposal.

- 4. In 2008 to 2011, a Ministries Assessment and Planning Committee (MAP) evaluated programmatic and physical needs of the church; consolidated LRPC and 2003 Facility Committee data; evaluated programmatic changes made since 2003 and impact on needs; met with groups within the church to update and understand current and future needs; shared "MAP Needs Summary" with the congregation, with positive feedback to proceed with process; congregation approved engagement with architecture firm MartinRiley of Fort Wayne, Indiana to develop building concept and opinion of probable cost (OPC)
- 5. The years of 2011 2012 saw the formation of a new Facility Committee which worked intimately with MartinRiley to form a building concept, which included a \$4.2 million OPC; Facility Committee took concept and OPC to Consistory for possible action.
- 6. In the years of 2012 thru 2014, the Consistory formed a working group of Facility Committee and Consistory members to work through proposal presentation needs and potential funding of any proposed facility project; that working group formed a Facility Finance Task Force which studied financial information and recommended Consistory proceed with a capital campaign. Consistory agreed to present Facility Committee Report and Proposal to the congregation for approval to enter into a Capital Campaign to fund a building project.
- 7. The congregation approved entering into the "Imagine Your Faith Building" campaign at a congregational meeting held on April 13, 2014 with 81.5% of those voting in favor.

Consistory Meeting Minutes – March 20, 2017:

- Meeting Minutes from 2/20/2017 Gloria Lauber moved to approve, 2nd by Betsy Ducey, approved.
- Budget & Stewardship Committee Joyce Kinsman made note of Bus Expenses (washer fluid pump, new tires), EA expenses. Budget Stewardship Investment Committee Meeting scheduled for April 10 @4PM. Joyce Kinsman moved to approve reports, 2nd by Nate Meyer, approved.
- Capital Campaign Committee A presentation during worship on April 23 will speak about the Capital Campaign. Karen Walker has resigned from Capital Campaign, and the committee will bring nominee names to the April Consistory meeting for approval.
- Mission Committee David Stuckey made note of the monthly mission support, as follows: \$1000 – Aroles CRHP, \$500 – Back Bay Mission, \$500 – Urgent

- Mission Outreach (Cru Robert and Jenni McMahon at BGSU), \$500 Reliant (formerly GCM), \$1000 SYF Mission Trip, \$1000 World Team (Franks). In addition, David moved to approve \$242 from Undesignated Mission Funds be sent to the Hope for Kajiado Sanitation Project (indoor plumbing), 2nd by Eric Nafziger, approved.
- Property Committee Eric Nafziger reported on the proposed playground project. Betsy Redd called 3 different companies for new playground equipment, 2 replied. Game Time Playgrounds is the company Property Committee is recommending to Consistory. 45' x 60' are the dimensions of the current playground Sue MacDonald met with the Property Committee and gave her ideas and thoughts. \$25,600 is a rough cost for this playground structure. Property Committee is seeking approval to move forward with this playground structure. The current pea gravel is no longer an approved ground cover, so new "ground cover/surfacing" is needed. Options for surfacing are: Wood Fiber (\$6000), with maintenance needed every two or three years, or Synthetic Turf (\$40,000). Fencing is required around the playground due to insurance reasons. Fencing was quoted two years ago with white vinyl, \$7,500, at that time. New quotes are being gathered now for current fencing pricing. A locking gate must be installed, cost is slightly higher for a locking gate. Entire project is projected roughly at \$50,000, including a charge of \$1,100 (by Game Time) for a 9 hour day to have 10-12 members of the church to help assemble with instruction by Game Time employees. Summer assembly is the goal. Can we move forward with this approval? Is this a good investment for the church to be involved in? Funding could come from the Buehrer Estate Legacy fund or the Legacy fund. Nate Meyer moved to proceed with finalizing the playground proposal, 2nd by Joyce Kinsman, approved. Property Committee will have an exact proposal for approval at the April Consistory meeting, which will then be shared with the congregation at a special congregational meeting. Per a quote sought by the committee, the Spiritual Council has approved up to \$5000 from the Memorial Fund for replacement of the exterior landscaping lights. Upgrade will include LED light, with a estimate of bulb life 100,000 hours.
- Spiritual Council Pastor Erich shared that the council spent time in prayer over being grace-filled, stemming from a recent challenge to SJCC to not be a lukewarm church. We need to be people of grace and understanding. The truth will always triumph. Council prepped for the Ordination and Installation

- of Pastor Alex @ 3PM on Sunday (3/26) afternoon.
- Pastor's Report Erich reminded everyone about the Leadership Retreat on April 24 & 25, 7-9PM. Sanctuary Organ: Larry Beck (organist) offered options as to what to do with the organ. The music personnel of SJCC must be a part of the process, otherwise the equipment may not be used effectively. Is there a way we could possibly have the organ played to its capacity, so the congregation can hear the issues with the organ? Deb Schnitkey is looking into further information about the organ, including Chapel Organ: Pastor Erich finding an organist. is working on getting into the Memorial cabinet for more information. Cub Scout Charter/Appeal Letter: Erich shared that over the past few years the Consistory has discussed continuing to be the charter organization of the local Cub Scout pack. Some of membership and leadership qualifications from the Scouts is inconsistent with the theological beliefs of the congregation. Consistory opted to maintain the charter as we had the responsibility to approve pack leaders, and we could witness to our faith beliefs through the local program. Yet, over the past two years, we have been unable to find a person willing to assume the responsibilities of being the Chartering Organization Representative, and Pastor Erich doesn't have the desire, time or energy to continue in that role. Amy Baden moved to terminate chartering the local pack, 2nd by Betsy Ducey, motion approved. Pastor Erich will communicate this to the pack leadership so they can make new plans for the fall program start up. The Evangelical Newsletter was passed around. If a desire is there to receive this newsletter, please contact Pastor Erich. The EA pastors of the Midwest region are hosting an event on Oct. 7th from 9-5 to celebrate the 500th anniversary of the protestant reformation. The event will be held at Berne, Indiana @ Cross Church.
- Associate's Pastor Report Pastor Alex continues with the planning for the SYF mission trip. Another payment was made towards the trip expenses, and excitement is underway! Recruiting for JYF volunteers is ongoing. Additional support is welcome. Please be in prayer for the future of JYF. For the remaining year, several JYF parents have stepped up to finish the current year. Looking for new leadership for next year.
- New Business Phone lines currently have 3, but one was for a fax machine, which we no longer have. Are 2 phone lines adequate? Eliminating one line would save \$26 per month. Motion to eliminate a line: Motion to approve - Joyce Kinsman, 2nd Amy Baden.

Ordination and Installation of Pastor Alex:

On Sunday, March 26th, we celebrated a service of worship for the Ordination to Christian Ministry of Alex J. Young. The service was held at 3PM in the sanctuary, followed by an open house in the parish hall hosted by the Fellowship Committee. Rev. Rhett Dodson, whom Pastor Alex met after graduating seminary, gave the message titled "On Being Prophetably Employed." Rev. Dodson serves the congregation of Grace Presbyterian Church in Hudson, Ohio. Pastor Alex shared his gratefulness for Rhett's ministry, his friendship, and his encouragement as Alex continued to seek where the Lord's call might lead him after he graduated seminary.
