pastor's letter

"For even the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many" (Mark 10:45).

Every Easter, the church pauses to remember what Jesus did on the cross and what it means for us today. One of my professors, Dr. Jay Sklar, has written on what it means that Jesus gave his life as a "ransom" for us. He explains that in our culture, the word "ransom" refers to the payment an innocent party is forced to pay in order to get back what was wrongfully taken from them. In the Bible, however, a "ransom" refers to a sum of money an offending party pays back to the innocent party. For example, if someone owned a bull that killed someone, their own life could be forfeit (Ex. 21:29). But if the bereaved family wanted to show mercy to the bull-owner, they could accept a payment of money from the bull-owner instead of his life (Ex. 21:30).

Because of our sin, our own lives are forfeit. The punishment we deserve is death. But because God is merciful and doesn't want us to perish, he can accept a payment, a ransom, instead of our lives. But what do we have that we could offer God in exchange for our lives? We have no payment that will be good enough, nothing that can take the place of our lives. This, then, is the truly amazing part of the gospel. First, God, in his mercy doesn't demand our lives for our sins, and instead agrees to accept a ransom. But then, even though he is the offended party, he offers to pay the ransom we're supposed to pay but can't afford. He pays for our sins. That is what Jesus does on the cross. When there seems to be no way for us to be made right with God, God himself, though Jesus, gives his life as a ransom for us, that we might be saved from death and made right with God.

What wonderfully good news! How does this affect your relationship with God, knowing how much he loves you? How can you share the good news of Jesus with others this month? How can you encourage family members to know God's merciful love more fully? How can you share God's amazing grace with people outside this church? That Jesus loves us so is news worthy to be shared!

As I write this, there are snow flurries outside, and it's cold and windy! You wouldn't guess that yesterday was the first day of spring! We started out the month of March with our "Farm Animals" theme. The children enjoyed playing with our farm and animals in the Block Area, washing muddy farm animals in the Sensory Table (washing off the chocolate pudding!), playing with our new cow numbermatching game in the Math Area, and several children worked together to complete our "farm" floor puzzle. We talked with the older children about the names of baby animals (colt, foal, kid, chick, piglet, etc.) and played a riddle game with the younger ones so they could guess which animal we were describing. Art projects for the week included a farm collage (with magazine pictures), chicken stick puppet (paper plate and fingerprints), and chick (fork painting). The following two weeks, we celebrated Easter, talking about bunnies, chicks, candy, eggs and baskets, but focusing on the most important reason for celebrating--Jesus's resurrection. The older children heard the story about Palm Sunday, when Jesus rode into Jerusalem, and concluded with the story of His death and resurrection. The children were in awe as they heard what Jesus went through for all of us, and how happy everyone was when He rose from the dead! Art projects included a 2-dimensional bunny/egg project with glitter, a foil egg decorated with collage materials, and a 3-dimensional cross with flowers. Our Bible verse for the month was, "He is not here. He has risen." Matthew 28:6. The last week of the month

was our Spring Break.

April Mission-A-Month Foods Resource Bank:

Foods Resource Bank (FRB), a Christian response to world hunger, was organized in 1999 to help provide the resources needed to support smallholder, agricultural food security programs in some of the world's poorest villages.

FRB does not ship grain or food overseas. Rather, they assist smallholder farmers and communities in the developing world with seeds, animals, tools, instruction, water supply - whatever is needed to produce ample food to feed themselves and their families, with enough left over to share, barter or sell to purchase staples, basic medicines, and send their children to school.

April gives us an opportunity to donate toward the planting, tending and harvesting of the community growing project we help sponsor in cooperation with the Church of the United Brethren and First Lutheran Church (both of Stryker). The fifteen acre field of beans/corn will be planted at the corner of St. Rt. 34 and Co. Rd. 22.75, southeast of Stryker. At harvest time, the crop will be sold and the proceeds given to FRB.

consistory/committees

Consistory Meeting Minute Highlights – March 19, 2018

• Budget & Stewardship Committee – Joyce Kinsman - financial reports – operating fund is running at a deficit, with much of that attributed to the rotary expense from the Brazil Mission trip, which will be reimbursed in April. Motion to approve the financials as presented, Joyce Kinsman, 2nd the motion, Eric Nafziger – motion approved.

 Capital Campaign Committee – Jeff Rutledge - as of March 1st we've raised \$582,713.00, not including investments. Option to contract with a professional fundraiser has been tabled. Committee is working on a five year timeline for the campaign, which would be until April 2020. Facility Proposal plans that have been met have been the Mother's Room, Playground, Outdoor Storage and the Office Remodel. Points to consider for action: 1) investigating the need to track and monitor member demographic data, example: age groups and household giving; 2) study long term usage of the farm ground and south lot property; 3) consider addressing needs of the Kitchen, Bathroom and Sanctuary prior to the April 2020 timeline; 4) consider redirecting funds, such as loose offering (non-designated money) to go to Capital Campaign.

• *Mission Committee* – Betsy Ducey – Laundry Ministry – Cecily Rohrs is coordinating a laundry program, \$500 was approved for this ministry; March donations included \$500 – Kajaido Children's home, \$500 – Back Bay Mission, \$500 – Hands of Grace, \$500 – Toledo Rescue Mission, \$500 – Cherry Street.

• *Property Committee* – Scott Short – the bell tower has another issue and is showing its age. The Verdin Bell company, the original manufacturer and installer of the bell system, looked at the bells again recently. Repairing the bells may cost up to \$40,000 to keep the bells swinging; reworking the bells to keep the bells stationary and swinging the bell clapper would cost \$17,180. Further information is being sought.

• Spiritual Council – Pastor Erich - Approval was given for the purchase of a new drum set for the sanctuary, at a cost of \$2,700, with funds to come from the Memorial Fund. Pastor Alex reported on the Stephen Ministry: 10 members of the church went to the introductory Stephen Ministry workshop on March 17th. All were encouraged in the ministry and want to pursue this program. Process of calling Stephen Leaders continues. Leader training is scheduled for early August for four Stephen Leaders; who would then come back and train Stephen Ministers.

• Pastor's Report – Pastor Erich – Security Team – Active shooter situations, projecting a safer church atmosphere. The greater scope of safety includes: risk management, security action plan, safe handling of offerings, life safety, emergency planning, sexual misconduct, child protection policy, fleet safety, food allergies. We are looking to conduct a church safety/ security ministry assessment. Joyce Kinsman is willing to help with anything needed to pursue this team assessment.

• Ten Year Plan of Ministry – Process Report – Pastor Erich is wanting to spend time in prayer and discernment for creating a ten year plan for SJCC. Pastor Erich would set aside Tuesday's for discernment. Days of discernment would begin at 9am and last until 4pm. Pastor Erich will spend time in prayer, the study of scripture and discernment, in meditation and will make use of vision work, the facility report and proposal, recent leadership and church planning research materials. Further consideration next meeting.

• School Prayer – Archbold Area Ministerial Association is encouraging anyone willing to pray over our school buildings. Wednesday March 28th 7pm, AHS, Wednesday April 4th 7pm, PHS.


• Habitat for Humanity has built a playhouse on a trailer that can be converted to a storage barn. The trailer will be moved from community to community in Fulton County. Pastor Erich is looking for approval to have the trailer set on the church property for one week. Motion to approve the trailer to sit on the church property, Mark Nofziger, 2nd the motion Judy Sears. Motion approved.

• Associate Pastors Report – Pastor Alex – Young Adult ministry is going well. They recently had a movie night, upcoming hockey night is in the works. Pastor Alex is meeting with parents of high school students, which is going well. Touching base and building communication with parents is good. Bruce Wooley has expressed interest in leading an adult fellowship time during the Sunday school hour. Classes will be discussion oriented, which will start the Sunday after Easter Sunday.

• Request from a non-profit agency to hold a fundraising event at SJCC in November. The event would include a meal, Chinese auction, 50/50 and sponsorships. The Consistory decided that we would not pursue having this event here at the church.

<u>Mindful Movement</u> – a weekly exercise class for women is designed to be a great stress reliever with low impact using inspirational music (instrumental and vocal popular Christian music) to provide a positive attitude with a focus on God. Women are invited to join these sessions, held at 8am on Saturday mornings in the church gym. The instructor is Jill Gilliland.
