pastor's letter

On Sunday, April 15th, I preached on the passage of Matthew 7:1-6 and spoke about Jesus' teaching on judging others. It's rather a simple lesson to understand – Matthew 7:1 -"Do not judge, or you too will be judged." We are not to have a judgmental attitude, we're not to be critical or fault-finding of others. It's a most difficult to lesson to live out. Throughout the Bible we mind God and Jesus teaching us to love one another, to even love our enemies, and our negative judging of others isn't consistent with loving people. Since I prepared for that message, and since I preached that message, I've strived ever harder to not give voice to any judgmental comments. I've found that my attitude and my conversations have been much more pleasing!

In the week following that sermon, I listened to several radio sports shows – analyst after analyst offering judgmental comments about athletes, and once again I began to wonder about the reality of our culture. When did it become the accepted practice that it's our right to question and analyze every athlete? Sports coverage 24 hours a day. Sure, there are the human interests stories about certain athletes that serve to inspire us through their achievements, but then there are the unrelenting verbal attacks and judgments – not just about the actual plays, but about the athletes themselves. The NFL draft is here – for months, there have been full reports of the character, the abilities, the intelligence, the issues, the traits of college athletes, getting down to the problems and "dirt" on each one.

Of course this type of analysis or reporting is not limited to college and professional athletes – politicians and entertainers are all subject to what I see as the public ridicule and judgment of both famous and infamous people. And such behavior has trickled down in to our everyday life – judging school teachers and staff, business owners and employees, public officials, and even our neighbors and family members.

The point? Let's put in to practice this teaching of Jesus – do not judge. Instead of offering a negative thought, stop, think and keep quiet. Train your brain to not even finish the thought – THINK:

T – is it true? H – is it helpful? I – is it inspiring? N – is it necessary? K – is it kind?

Think – if what I am about to say does not pass those tests, I will keep my mouth shut!

May Mission-A-Month Cherry Street Mission Ministries

Cherry Street was founded on Biblical principles in 1947, and remains a Biblically-based, Christ centered organization today. Their Spiritual Advocates consist of both staff and volunteers that lead Bible studies daily and mentor guests through their journey with Christ. Cherry Street has a Men's Division, Women's Division (Sparrow's Nest) and food services.

Each night, Cherry Street provides safe, free shelter for nearly 230 men and women who would otherwise sleep on the street or remain in an abusive situation. For some, it's the first night they've slept safely in a very long time.

Cherry Street is more than food, clothing and shelter. Their redemptive programming is built around one on one discipleship. They care more about who a person is, rather than what a person has become.

Cherry Street is the only organization in the region to offer 3 meals a day, 7 days a week, free of charge to anyone who needs them. Cherry Street gratefully accepts financial donations and gift-in-kind donations (anything donated that is not cash). Consistory Meeting Minute Highlights – April 16, 2018 Committee Reports:

- 1. Budget & Stewardship John Graber
 - a. Financial Reports All reports are good. The markets have been changing rapidly. The last quarterly report was down, but overall we are doing fine. Committee will keep a close look at financials for 90 days. Agreement from the committee was to keep things the same for now. Motion to approve Financials Betsy Ducey, 2nd the motion Eric Nafziger
 - b. Authorized Financial Representatives for EGR – an annual document. Authorized financial representatives are: Joyce Kinsman, Kelly Stahl, Brent Winzeler and Roger Miller. Motion to approve representatives: Gloria Lauber, Ann Fether 2nd the motion. Motion approved.
- 2. Capital Campaign Committee Jeff Rutledge
 - a. Follow up to last month's reports Donation Demographics – Budget & Stewardship is looking at the demographics from the financial aspect represented by the school districts in which people of our congregation live, and also the demographics of members by age, members and nonmembers. 146 households give financially to the church. If the 146 households tithe their income at 10% within all the school districts that attend SJCC, we should be receiving roughly \$834,359.00 per year. Reports are from the Ohio Department of Education.
- 3. Evangelism Committee Gloria Lauber
 - a. Skye Cinema is now showing our SJCC "ad" before all movies are played. Church name and website is on the "ad", along with a C.S. Lewis quote. A questionnaire is going to be handed out to members with some open ended questions, concerns and suggestions to see what areas we could improve on, or to bring praises for what we're doing well. The questionnaire will be presented at our next Consistory meeting. August 5th will be our annual Book Bag Bash.

- 4. Mission Committee Betsy Ducey Please be in prayer for Pastor Erich, Mark Nofziger, Crissi Stuckey and Linda Heer, who are heading to Brazil for the mission trip. Disbursements were as follows:

 - b. Kajiado Children's Home \$525
 - c. Funds for college scholarships were held for next month
- 5. Property Committee Dean Sauder
 - a. A work day will be held on 4/21/2018 (8am-noon). Cost of repairing bells in the bell tower is roughly \$17,000, with additional costs for a lift and shipping (roughly an additional \$1000). Sandblasting of the steel up in the bell tower is recommended. Sandblasting would be done before the bells would be fixed. If a motion is passed, the bell towers could be changed in July. It was brought up about putting a gas fireplace in the Fireside Room.
- 6. Spiritual Council Erich Christman
 - a. Stephen leaders will be attending training of one full week in June or August.
 - b. Senior High Sunday School Dave and Paige Miller and Rachel Kinsman are ending their time teaching. Ryan and Devin Bernath are considering teaching the Senior High, and Jen Hurst may also help with teaching this summer.
