What better message could a small baby bring that Christmas morning so many years ago?

"Blessed are the peacemakers, For they will be called Children of God." Matthew 5:9

The beautiful anthem "Let There Be Peace on Earth" was developed in 1955, with the words written by Jill Jackson and the melody by her husband, Sy Miller. The song was devoted to world peace and harmony among people, and how each one of us could make a difference.

A decade later, the song was introduced at a California retreat to a group of young people who were from a wide variety of religious, ethnic, and socioeconomic backgrounds. The young people had come together for a weeklong experience devoted to developing friendship and understanding through education, discussion, and working together. The song's focus on peace and God made it easy to cross many boundaries.

When they came down from the mountain, these inspired young people brought the song with them and started sharing it. It traveled first with them back to their homes and schools, churches, and clubs. Before long, the song was being shared in all fifty states – at school graduations, at Christmas and Easter gatherings, and at various celebrations of peace and brotherhood. It became a theme for clubs. It was recorded, copied, printed in song books and passed by word of mouth. The song spread overseas.

In Sy Miller's words: "This simple thought, 'Let there Be Peace on Earth, and Let it Begin With Me' first born on a mountain top in the voices of youth, continues to travel heart to heart – gathering in people everywhere who wish to become a note in a song of understanding and peace – peace for all mankind."

Tuesday, December 4th...

The Advent and Christmas season is an excellent time to pause and trace our passage through our yearly, earthly pilgrimage. Each December we can look back and marvel at the designs and purposes of God and recognize how very little we are in control of the events that have shaped the past year. Then with hearts overflowing, look to the observance of that silent, holy night and all its assurance. Because of Christmas, this we know: Christ was born for us. He is love and all the plans He has for us always exceed those of our own. We may be struck by the contrast of our own busy Christmas anticipation compared to the lack of regard it received two thousand years ago. On the night of the original event, not a single innkeeper had space to house the King of Kings. They missed the grandest miracle of all!

All of us are in need of a miracle. In this hectic season, we may live with a sense of urgency for the wrong reasons. Look around you this Christmas. Watch for the miracles of the season.

I pray that those of us who prepare so thoroughly for the holiday celebration might not miss the reason for the season. No matter how full our lives are, I hope we will still have room in our hearts to search for the one whose birth forever changed the world...the same one who is still working Christmas miracles among us.

Wednesday, December 5th...

But when she complained that Mary was not doing her part, Jesus said that Mary had chosen what was better. What did that mean? One thing is essential, and Mary has chosen it - it's the main course, and it won't be taken from her." Take a deep breath and REFOCUS on Jesus. You'll be glad you did ...and so will Jesus!

Finally, in the book of Revelation, according to the King James version of the Bible, the apostle John describes Jesus as a powerful, fearsome and triumphant warrior King. Please read Revelation 19:11-16. In these verses Heaven is opened, and He comes down from Heaven riding on a white horse, to make war against, and judge evil. He is called "Faithful and True". However, if you believe in Him, your life is changing because of Him, you have the blessed expectation of eternal life because of Him, then you can assuredly call Him by the name "Savior".

Saturday, December 22nd...

Throughout the Bible, Jesus has been given many titles and names. The most obvious title at Christmas is "Christ". Let us look at a few of His titles and names.

What is the meaning of the title "Christ"? In the Bible, 1 Samuel 24 recounts that Saul, the anointed king of Israel, was in pursuit of David, the anointed, soon to be greatest king of Israel, intending to kill him. Saul had to take a pause in a cave in the wilderness of En Gedi. David and his men were hiding in this same cave. David had a great opportunity to kill Saul, but did not. Why? David did not want to kill Saul because Saul was the Lord's anointed king of Israel. In the Bible I am reading through, there are reference notes about "the Lord's anointed" associated with 1 Samuel 2:10. In said notes it is reported that the English word "Messiah" comes from the Hebrew word meaning "anointed". In the New Testament "Christ" translates from the Greek word "Christos", also meaning "anointed".

At this Christmas time, we celebrate the birth of the Lord Jesus as a man. He is referenced as "Baby Jesus", "Infant Lowly" and "Helpless Babe" in some popular Christmas songs. In Luke 1:30-32, when the angel Gabriel announces to Mary that she will conceive and bear a Son, that she will call His name "Jesus", and He will be the "Son of the Highest". The Lord God will also give Him the throne of His father David, implying that He will be a "King" of a kingdom that will be eternal.

We also think of Jesus as the perfect "Lamb of God", and the "Son of Man" without blemish. He was the perfect sacrifice, meek and lowly, as a lamb, for our sins. He was brutally scourged and crucified for us. Have you ever seriously considered the severe pain and torture our Savior, as a man, was subjected to for us?

Thursday, December 6th...

The days pass so quickly, and here we are again at the Advent season. One annual event I look forward to is my trip to Charlotte, NC to work at the distribution center of Operation Christmas Child. Last year I had an experience I feel worth sharing. For some time, God and I had been arguing about money. I felt God telling me to give money to someone in Charlotte. I had someone give her the money inside a devotional book that I bought at the Billy Graham Library.

Last year I also met Gabe. He was 28 and blind from birth. His positive attitude and the message he shared with me was such a blessing! These bonds were not coincidental; we were all part of God's plan! We all stay in touch and are making plans to get together again this year. The relational gifts I received from these two people are the greatest gifts of all!

The end result: Jesus takes those little scraps of our life and makes something beautiful, an heirloom quilt, ready to pass down to the next generation. Our faith becomes a legacy for generations to come, pointing others to Christ. May you be willing to undergo the process of "perfect peace-ing" with the Lord this Advent season.

When they were ready to leave, they brought out a large Christmas present that they presented to Mark. As he tore off the paper, imagine our surprise – a big yellow Tonka truck: the very one Mark had picked out! How could they have known? As they shared a prayer with us and headed out the door, Ray pressed an envelope into my hand and said, "God bless you


I hope you will take time to be still this holiday season, and that in doing so, you may experience the utmost joy in Christ.

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Sunday, December 16th...

We recall many Bible verses familiar to the Advent season, prophecies of Jesus' coming and the events leading up to his

Historically, King Ahaz was facing strong enemies and had just received discouraging news that the enemy forces were increasing. But the Lord provided a message that the enemy would not prevail and that Ahaz should ask for a sign to confirm this. Ahaz would not ask, even though he was supposed to. So Isaiah responds "Therefore the Lord himself will give you a sign: The virgin will be with child and will give birth to a son, and will call him Immanuel." Immanuel means 'God with us'.

What does it mean to say that God is with us? Consider instances from the Bible. One time when God was clearly present was in the pillars of fire and cloud in the Israelite camp. That started when the Israelites were fresh out of Egypt with limited experience with God. My topical index lists some purposes of the pillars as guidance, protection, regulating the journey, communicating, and manifesting glory.

In the New Testament, God was with people in the flesh; Jesus walked among them. Maybe the best illustration would be when Jesus was not immediately with them. One evening Jesus sent the disciples out to sea without him. But a strong wind was blowing; the waves were rocking the boat. Even worse, there appeared to be a ghost walking on the water toward them. Not until the disciples cried out did Jesus come to them, calm their fears, and stop the wind. We can easily be distracted by circumstances, but when God is with us, He can manage our problems and deal with our fear.

Another time, Jesus was with them without them knowing. After the resurrection, Jesus joined two walkers to Emmaus. Their time together was spent with Jesus explaining how all the Scripture was leading up to Christ's death and resurrection.

Thursday, December 13th...

While thinking what I wanted to say about Advent and Christmas the following came to me - John 3:16-17. These two verses show us "why" Jesus came to earth and "why" we celebrate Christmas and Advent.

"For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only son, that whoever believes in Him shall not perish but have eternal life. For God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world but to save the world through him."

Most of us can recite these verses by memory and in their simplicity, we can see the great love God has for us. To send your only child to this wicked world, to die a horrible death for sinners - no greater gift of love has ever been given to anyone.

In a way, we continue to live in a state of Advent, as we look forward to Christ's coming again. .. we wait to see Him face to face once we are no longer in this world. To finally see His face and walk, hand in hand with Christ, and live in the place that he has prepared for all who believe in him will be a fantastic celebration!

As we look forward to celebrating Christmas and remembering the birth of Christ, are YOU ready for him to come again? Do YOU believe in Jesus as your Savior so you do not perish? Are YOU ready to live with the Christ Child for all eternity? All we need to do is believe in God's only Son and we will have that eternal life.

Thank you heavenly Father, for loving us all so much that you sent your Son, Jesus, to die in our place so we will not perish.
