Pastor's Letter

This year, Jenny and I set up two Christmas trees. In our living room, we have a seven-foot, dark green tree, adorned with bulbs and beads and lights and numerous other ornaments. In our nursery, we have a small 3-foot, white tree, wrapped with pink ribbons and bulbs as we await the birth of our baby girl in early January.

There is a lot that goes into preparing for Christmas. Bringing boxes of ornaments up from the basement or down from the attic. Setting up the tree and decking it out with (working) lights. Stringing lights along the roof and wrapping trees and bushes with lights. Browsing Care 'N' Share for the finishing touches. Coordinating schedules to find the right time to celebrate with family or friends. Finding the perfect presents. Baking delicious sweets.

And there is a lot that goes into preparing for a baby! Finding the big items, like the crib, the stroller, and the car seat. Getting clothes and diapers and books and toys. Going to numerous doctor appointments and classes. Asking lots and lots of questions. Praying often for the love and wisdom to be good parents.

During the weeks leading up to Christmas, as a church, we celebrate the season of Advent, which is all about us getting ready for Jesus. Jesus promised that one day he would return to the earth, and that he would bring all of heaven with him. In Revelation 21, we see this depicted as a massive golden city (almost 2,000,000 sq. mi., compared to NYC at about 300 sq. mi.) coming down from the sky and resting on earth. This new heaven-earth union will be the home of God and all his people, who will dwell together in love, peace, and joy amidst the paradise of golden streets, crystal clear water, and trees abounding in fruit.

Wow. There's nothing quite like reading these final chapters in Revelation to fill our hearts with joy and hope and longing. And if this is the glorious future we have to look forward to as members of God's family, the question stands: what are we doing to get ready for Jesus? Yes, we get ready for Christmas by decorating our houses and sending out Christmas cards, and yes, we get ready for a newborn baby with all that's needed for raising a baby. But what are we doing to prepare for Jesus' return?

This Advent season, let's commit ourselves to being more intentional in preparing for Jesus' return. First, let's commit to preparing ourselves, by making our hearts a fit home for our Lord. Think of a sin-struggle in your life that often tempts you. Perhaps sins of the tongue? Perhaps sins of the mind? Perhaps sins of the heart? Pick one area where you haven't been putting up much of a fight, and have just been letting sin take the reigns and control your thoughts, or words, or desires, or actions. This Advent season, commit to putting up a fight. Say no to this particular sin, as you make your heart a fitting home for your Lord.

We also prepare for Jesus not only by sweeping our hearts clean, but by decorating our hearts...not with Christmas lights and ornaments, but with faithfulness, goodness, and truth, and every virtue fitting a follower of Christ. Lastly, we prepare for Jesus' coming not only by preparing ourselves, but also by helping our friends, family, and others prepare as well. Remember how the Apostle John described that golden city as being thousands of times bigger than the biggest city in our country today. There is still room! Let us commit not only to preparing for Christmas, but also for preparing for the return of Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

Pastor Erich shares "An Update on My Recovery" – First, thank you for your prayers and concern! It has been a tremendous blessing to be so well prayed for and encouraged these past months.

I had my three month post-surgery follow up on November 15th. The x-rays revealed that my back is healing very, very well. So well in fact, that the neurosurgeon told me that God has answered my prayers – my healing is exceptional. That was blessed news to hear, especially when he shared that with the type of operation I had, and the condition of my spine, such success is rare. In those moments I was certainly thanking the Lord for his healing powers.

And then I heard news that I at first struggled to hear and comprehend, but in the days since, greater acceptance has settled upon my mind. Due to the condition of my spine, and the reality of spinal stenosis and arthritis, I have to use intelligence and be wise in future activities. I know, I know, that might be hard for me to do! I am still under restrictions of lifting weight and twisting my spine, as the spinal fusion won't be fully healed until six months or so. The neurosurgeon reminded me that the point of the surgery was to remove the pain I was enduring, and so, the operation was very successful!

I'm also grateful for the number of people asking about and praying for my son, Ryan. He, and Lynne and I are learning the real truth of patience. Ryan has been back to work full-time for several weeks now, and is engaged in an exercise routine to rebuild his core strength, and he has only had two small flare ups of his crohn's. So healing is occurring!! But the "pocket" left from the removal of the large abscess in July continues to heal slowly, which requires packing an open wound for drainage morning and evening. He has an appointment this week with his specialist, and either he will be given the all clear sign to start taking his new crohn's medication, which should put it into remission, or he will be sent for a second opinion at the Cleveland Clinic in December.

Preschool Corner- Even though we participated in many fall activities this past month, the children have also really enjoyed watching the snow fall outside our windows! At the beginning of the month, we spent a week on our "Fall" theme, then moved on to "Thanksgiving". We talked about signs of fall, the "Ff" sound, and had some beautiful leaves, pinecones, and buckeyes at our Science Area. Both classes made fall trees at the Art Area, and the older children played 2 dice games at the Fine Motor Area ("Roll a Scarecrow", where they placed small pieces on the game board to build a scarecrow face) and in the Game Area ("Candy Corn Roll & Cover", where they matched numbers on the dice with written numbers, in order to fill up orange/yellow/white areas on a candy corn mat.) The younger children played a "Pumpkin Shape Matching" game and made owls in the Art Area with real leaves. During our "Thanksgiving" theme, we focused on the blessings God gives us, and how we are thankful for them. We also talked about the first Thanksgiving, and how it differs from our Thanksgiving today. All of the children worked on their cutting skills in the Fine Motor Area with some turkey activities, and

we sang some fun songs such as "Turkey in the Straw", "Turkey Trot Hokey Pokey" and "There's a Turkey on My Nose". The final week of the month, we talked about "Dinosaurs". We talked about meat eaters and plant eaters, and how to tell which dinosaurs fit into each category. We named many different types of dinosaurs, and the characteristics of each. All of the children were able to play with dinosaurs in the block area, and the older children had dinosaur floor puzzles they could put together with a friend at the Problem Solving Area.

Back Bay Mission Trip – February 9th through 16th.

Volunteers from St. John's Christian Church will have opportunities to share in the work program (new home construction and home repair/renovation), the daily community soup kitchen, the weekly food pantry ministry and their daily assistance program with area homeless.

Pastor Erich is coordinating increased opportunities for people to engage in people related ministries during the week. He is working with Back Bay Mission (BBM) staff to provide morning and afternoon programs for interactions in their Micah Day Center, which provides several aspects of assistance to the homeless. The plan is that volunteers will engage in neighborhood outreach activities, helping BBM staff further their ministry in the local neighborhoods.

Trip participants will have the opportunity to sign-up for the construction projects or the ministry projects on a daily basis, Monday through Friday, based on their personal preferences.

Besides the daily projects, participants will enjoy blessed fellowship throughout the week – enjoying some local cuisine (seafood or BBQ), preparing many meals together in the mission house, and spending the evenings relaxing in the mission house or exploring parts of the city.

The trip is open to youth (14 years of age or older) and adults. The church's mission budget covers some of the cost of the trip, which is still being determined due to a change in BBM's rate structure. Many people have participated on past trips through the generous blessing of others – people who are unable to go on the trip have given funds to allow others to go who are concerned about the full cost.

December Mission-A-Month Crossroads

For more than 134 years, Crossroad Child & Family Services in Fort Wayne, Indiana, has focused on the needs of children and families who have few alternatives.

Today, they work with emotionally troubled children other providers have chosen not to work with, or have failed to help. These children may also be mentally developmentally disabled, autistic and/or experiencing the results of brain trauma, have parents with substance abuse problems and/or have experienced sexual abuse. In their residential and education services, these children are as young as age six. Much too often they are children who have been hurt the worst by those who should have protected them the most.


Their needs for therapy, education, and family support services are complicated and challenging. Yet, Crossroad's outcomes are extremely good! Crossroad provides services in their school "Crossroad Academy", and in residential, outpatient, and community based services. In October they opened an emergency shelter care program for girls with mental health issues. Crossroad will serve nearly 400 youth this year.

Today, the growing adult opioid epidemic (heroin/prescription drug addiction) and trafficking trends has led to a growing number of children needing therapeutic help; there are more children on Crossroad's waiting list for services than their total number of beds. The need is growing and Crossroad needs resources to help more children!

Excerpts from a letter from Gaye List, Chairperson, International Board of Directors Kajiado Children's Home

Thank you so much for your support of \$1,245.00 on October 29, 2018. You are making an incredible impact on their life by providing hope... hope for education, hope for physical and spiritual nutrition, and an empowering hope to build a better tomorrow for themselves. There are no administrative fees deducted from your donation, and 100% of sponsorships are used to support these orphaned children.

Please keep these children and the following goals in your hearts and prayers:

Rescue 20 additional orphans by the end of January, who have no other means of support. As we identify children in desperate situations, it will cost \$3,000 to provide transportation, medical exams, school uniforms and basic essentials for these children. We also need to identify sponsors for these children to provide the cost of care, food, lodging, school fees, etc.

Build an additional greenhouse so that more crops can be grown to offset food costs. There is an estimated \$10,000 cost to this project.

Provide a tutoring program - bring in three teachers, five nights per week, to teach a different subject each night. One teacher teaches grades 1-2. A second teacher teaches grades 3-5, and a third teacher teaches grades 6-8. Often children did not attend school regularly (if at all) before coming to the home, and are behind in their studies. The budgeted cost of the tutoring program for 70 children, five nights per week is \$500/week, which equates to approximately \$7 per child. This is such a wonderful investment in their future as we provide the tools for them to learn.

Add indoor toilets to the dorms so the children will not need to use the outside pit latrine. This increases sanitation and health goals for the children who live in the home. There is an estimated \$10,000 cost to this project, including the addition of a septic tank.

Provide sound equipment for the multipurpose building where they hold worship services on Sundays. There is an estimated \$3,000 cost to this project. We have a commitment for about one-third of this cost.

We wish you much joy, peace, love and blessings as we begin to close out 2018 and start to think about 2019. Thank you for all you do for the children of Kajiado.

Highlights of the November 19, 2018 Consistory Meeting

Devotions – Jeff Rutledge – Spiritual Leadership/followers, Honoring Pastors. Hebrews 13:17; Leadership requires follow-ship.

Committee Reports:

- Budget & Stewardship Committee Joyce Kinsman Praying over Sunday morning offerings for the months of Nov/Dec. The Budget and Stewardship committee met in early November to discuss the budget for next year. Without Personnel Committee input yet, the 2019 budget is \$1500 over the 2018 budget.
- Transfer of Funds Motion to transfer money from Buehrer Estate checking account to Buehrer Estate Legacy Fund to keep the checking account balance at a maximum of \$5,000.
- Capital Campaign Committee Jeff Rutledge Capital Campaign chose to meet together and spend their time in prayer, after having the loss of the committee co-chair, Jim Redd. Anyone feeling led to serve on the 2018 Facility committee, please contact Jeff Rutledge. Jeff Rutledge has volunteered to chair the Facility committee.
- Personnel Committee Jeff Rutledge All of the annual reviews were done, with the exception for Dean (his will be this coming Sunday). Quotes have been received on Health Insurance. There is a custodial position available that the committee is looking to fill.
- Evangelism Committee Gloria Lauber We will continue with Skye Cinema ad. Sarah Nafziger will continue to be the contact for Skye to update those ads. Names were brought to the group and those people will be contacted to fill the available positions on the committee. Judy Sears will take over as the chair for Evangelism Committee in 2019.
- Farm Operations Committee Eric Nafziger Committee met on 11/13, Rod Kinsman is the chairperson. CRP & CREP Payments, Annual Rental Income, \$838 received in October. That is an annual payment for the next 15 years. Will discuss renewing cash rent contract or rebidding contract in the fall of 2019
- Mission Committee Betsy Ducey Working on a mission budget for 2019. Disbursements: Tom & Megan L Atlink \$1000, Aroles \$1000, Franks \$1000, Campus Ministries \$1000 (\$250 each to the four ministries on 11/11). Motion to request for expensing undesignated benevolent funds to Schrock Family (seeking to serve alongside the Suon's in DR \$250) and also Dominican Republic Mission Trip \$2000.
- Preschool Board Ann Fether Board met on Nov 6th, enrollment is still at 43 students. Our balance is \$7977.63. Donations are being received, which has been a blessing. Preschool will be in the Parade of Lights. Students, teachers and parents are invited to ride in the parade. Enrollment for 2019 preschool will begin Jan 1st. As of right now, classes will stay the way they are, and possibly change days/times at a later date.

- Property Committee Dean Sauder Landscaping is completed. The rosebushes will be removed and replaced with something else at a later date. The only thing that needs completed yet is attaching the soaker hoses. The boiler has been looked at by a technician from Michigan. The boiler is in good condition, but there is concern on a few safety measures. We are working on getting bids for maintenance on the boiler system, which will be done next year when the boiler is not in use. The coffee machine is fixed and is back in use. Drinking fountains are being researched and haven't located anything as of yet. The Committee is looking at a power snow brush for this winter, to help make shoveling snow an easier task for our volunteers. \$1,650.00 is the cost for the power brush. Are there plans for the sprinkler system? The sprinkler system has not been used in 2 years.
- Spiritual Council Erich Christman We are in the nomination process of replacing members of Consistory. Be in prayer over the nomination process. Announcements will be made asking for volunteers. Approved the membership of new members.
- Pastors Report Erich Christman 2018 Discernment Team worked through worship and is now discussing Christian Education. Trying to make goals and objectives and keep things moving. Church Admin Software looking at 3 different products, costs are very comparable from company to company. Demos are scheduled to get input from Staff. Online giving is supported through all 3 companies.
- Associate Pastor's Report Alex Young Stephen Ministry Delayed the start of training until January.
- New Business Archbold Engineering Dept. A public hearing has been set for Monday, Dec. 10th at 7pm in the Council Chambers with the Archbold Planning Committee. Mr. Jim Rivello, McDonald's Corporation is requesting to rezone the east portion of parcel 17-033396-00.000 which is R-3 Medium Density Residential to B-2 Highway & Commercial Business. Said parcel is the east half of the truck parking lot and grass area. This is in accordance with Section 152.160 (A) regarding change in zoning district. Our property is within 200' of the applicant so we were notified.

Nomination Process in Preparation for the Annual Election of Congregational Leadership

The Spiritual Council is currently engaged in the annual nomination process, calling upon members of the church to consider being nominated for the election ballot of leadership offices. Following prayer, and with discernment, the council compiles a list of nominees and then contact is made with the nominees, seeking to fill the ballot. The church constitution requires that there be 4 nominees for the 2 open offices of elder and 6 nominees for the 3 open offices of deacon/deaconess.

As the calling process is well underway, it is apparent that many of the nominees are not interested in serving, for many qualified reasons. As the council seeks to fill the ballot, we ask the congregation to be in prayer for the process, and we ask for people to consider volunteering as a nominee. Potential volunteers may speak with any of the following elders: Betsy Ducey, Ann Fether, Joyce Kinsman, Gloria Lauber, Jeff Rutledge and Greg Walker.
