The Beatitudes – Matthew 5:3-10

"Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. 4 Blessed are those who mourn, for they will be comforted. 5 Blessed are the meek, for they will inherit the earth. 6 Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they will be filled. 7 Blessed are the merciful, for they will be shown mercy. 8 Blessed are the pure in heart, for they will see God. 9 Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called sons of God. 10 Blessed are those who are persecuted because of righteousness, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven."

In the Greek, the word translated "blessed" can also mean happy, happier, fortunate and how joyful. In these beatitudes Jesus speaks of the present and the future. The blessings experienced through the teaching of Jesus have both a present and a future affect, and those blessings are realized through believing in Jesus and in His teachings. These beatitudes are true, they are real. Blessings do come as Jesus says they will come. I wish I could have been one of the original listeners, to ask questions and probe the deeper meanings of these words. But I am sure they were words of hope, words that calmed people down and pointed them to God.

Many people are poor in spirit in these difficult, difficult days of pandemic. To offer some blessing, some happiness, I share this devotional I came across many years ago.

Six Instances of Truth and Character

- 1.In a particular village experiencing a drought, all the villagers decided to pray for rain. On the day of prayer all the people gathered, but only one boy came with an umbrella. That's FAITH.
- 2. When you toss a baby in the air, she laughs because she knows you will catch her. That's TRUST
- 3. Every night we go to bed, without any assurance of being alive the next morning, but still we set the alarm to wake us up. That's HOPE
- 4. We plan big things for tomorrow in spite of zero knowledge of the future. That's CONFIDENCE
- 5. We see the world suffering, but still many get married and many have children. That's LOVE
- 6.On an old man's shirt was written a sentence 'I am not 81 years old....I am sweet 16 with 65 years of experience. That's ATTITUDE

Be sure to concentrate on the first one, because without FAITH, you will never get to the rest of them.

Digital Sign

As shared in last month's Visitor, the Consistory has approved a recommendation from the Property Committee concerning the installation of a digital sign. The Archbold Zoning Board of Appeals will act upon a permit at an August 13th meeting.

Resumption of Ministry Plans – For August 1st Implementation

The Consistory puts forth the following resumption plan details:

- 1. In light of the fact that the pandemic is not over, continued caution will be observed as we resume our in-person ministries.
- 2. Since resuming in-person worship on May 31st, SJCC has had 8 Sundays of worship in the sanctuary, and there is no awareness of any Covid-19 positive cases.
- 3. SJCC will practice recommended safety protocols as realistically as feasible, including:
 - a. Encouraging everyone to practice good hygiene (washing hands, covering coughs/sneezes)
 - b. Encouraging everyone to take temperatures before arriving at church, and if their temperature is 100 degrees or higher, asking that they stay in their residence
 - c. Asking a person who is sick or not feeling well, or lives with or cares for someone who is sick or not feeling well, to stay in their residence until feeling well.
 - d. Per the Governor's Order, as of July 23, 2020, 6:00pm, and until that order is rescinded, face coverings will be required for all services, meetings and activities in the SJCC church buildings and outdoors on the SJCC church property when 6' social distance is unable to be maintained, unless one of the exclusions in the state order applies.

- 4. SJCC acknowledges that some level of risk will always be present when people occupy our church facilities or are engaged in church ministries that meet elsewhere.
- 5. SJCC recognizes that the spiritual health of a person is as important as a person's physical health, and we are striving to provide a plan that addresses the holistic health of all.
- 6. We trust people to be wise in making their own decisions regarding their physical presence for in-person worship and/or participation in any of the ministries of SJCC.
- 7. Based on current protocols from the State of Ohio, SJCC will operate on the following schedule:
 - a. We will continue to maintain two empty pews between occupied pews. People will be directed to stagger their seating, so that they are not sitting directly behind someone in the nearest available pew in front of them. People will be directed to maintain a 6' social distance in the pews unless all people in one pew are in agreement to sit together. We will continue to have children remain in the pews for the children's messages.

As people enter and exit the building, everyone should practice social distancing, exiting the sanctuary from the rear to the front and leaving the hallway in a steady and safe fashion.

We will continue to live stream the 10:30am service.

Song lyrics and Bible readings will be displayed on the screen, with people encouraged to bring their own Bibles for their use in the pews.

Sanitization of the sanctuary, hallways and restrooms will occur between services as needed.

- b. August 2nd exterior doors will no longer be propped open once the heat of the day dictates their closure; this will be reassessed as we progress through the summer towards autumn.
- c. August 2nd offering plates will remain at the entrance doors of the sanctuary, and entrance doors will remain propped open until after the service begins, at which time they will be closed, and then reopened during the closing song.
- d. August 3rd in addition to unlocking the east accessible entrance each day, we will resume to unlocking the carport entrance and the south porch entrance on a daily basis.
- e. August 3rd in-person pastoral visits will resume per individual preferences or per facility protocols for care facility residents. (The pastors have made some in-person pastoral visits over the course of the past few months, based on the serious level of health situations.)
- f. The hope for August 16th is to observe Rally Sunday and welcome all age levels back for Sunday school, and Small Groups may resume in-person gatherings.
 - i. As the 16th approaches, the current Covid situation will be assessed and reviewed.
 - ii. Resuming Sunday school is dependent upon availability of teachers. We recognize that available class spaces may not enable social distancing for our adult classes, and we will leave it to each class to decide if and how they want to meet.
 - iii. we will reopen use of the mother's room. We will reopen use of the nursery, and for the 10:30am service it may not be staffed with volunteers depending upon the willingness of individuals to return and care for children during the pandemic.

- iv. We will resume services of Baptism and Dedication as they are scheduled.
- g. The hope for September 9th or 16th is to resume our Wednesday evening ministries, with specific protocols in place for the Logos Family Time meal, while remaining open to the guidance and experience of what our local schools experience as the school year resumes in August, as well as an assessment of the current Covid situation.
- 8. The resumption of the following August/September ministries remains under consideration:
 - a. Chancel Choir past participants will be surveyed regarding their preferences
 - b. Annual Chicken Barbeque will be held on September 27th with socially distant seating available in the parish hall, or outside in the east lawn, or via carry out.
 - c. TGRM Chapel and Meal Ministry
 - d. Third Thursday Luncheons
- 9. The drinking fountains and coffee service will remain unavailable until further notice.

Special Congregational Meeting - September 20th, 9:15am

The Consistory has called for a special meeting of the congregation to discuss and take any action on the following three items:

- 1. To discuss and act upon the future of the Sanctuary Pipe Organ
- 2. To discuss and act upon the proposed position of a Pastor of Music and Worship
- 3. To discuss and act upon the consideration of purchasing the property that is east of the church.

Meeting a Quorum

As the Church Constitution stipulates a 40% quorum when electing a pastor, the Consistory is using that guideline for this congregational meeting, even though a pastor will not be elected or called in this meeting. The two agenda items are very significant and will have long term affects upon the church's ministry, and so the Consistory is asking for a higher percentage of the members be present.

A 40% quorum dictates that there be at least 164 members present for this meeting.

1) Sanctuary Pipe Organ

The Issues

- 1. The pipe organ requires maintenance and repair work estimated to cost between \$200,000 and \$250,000.
- 2. There is a nationwide shortage of organists, which is certainly evident in our area.
- 3. Organ music is seemingly no longer deemed as essential to congregational worship as it was when the church building was constructed in 1956 and 1957.
- 4. As plans are in the process of being formulated for a renovation of the sanctuary, it is necessary to know if the pipe organ will remain in place, be replaced, or be removed.

Information

In 2017, information was gathered from a variety of sources regarding the present state and future use of the organ. That information was compiled into a ten page document and copies of that study are available from the church office – either in a printed or digital format.

Recommendation

By a majority vote, the Consistory has recommended that the pipe organ be removed from the sanctuary, which was also the recommendation of the Discernment Team in 2019.

Congregational Meeting Discussion Points

- 1. Organist availability
- 2. Desired inclusion of organ music within our congregational worship in the present and future
- 3. Cost of the solution possibly \$100,000 for a digital organ or up to \$250,000 to repair the organ

2) Pastor of Music and Worship

Recommendation

During its review and visioning work in 2018 and 2019, one of the key recommendations from the Discernment Team to the Consistory was to invigorate and expand our worship ministries. The recommended way discerned to accomplish this was to create a new ministerial staff position, which is currently being called the Pastor of Music and Worship. The Consistory then discussed this recommendation and at their June 2020 meeting they tasked the Personnel Committee with finalizing a job description and compensation package for this position.

Job Description

Pastor of Music and Worship - Proposed Job Description - Revised as of July 16, 2020

This position's main focus will be on the leading and development of passionate and Christ-centered worship ministries of the church. The ideal candidate should be:

1. A fully devoted disciple of Jesus Christ whose character models the holy life and bears witness to the leadership of the Holy Spirit.

2. Called by God to serve Him in and affirmed by the Church.

- 3. Educated, with a college or master's degree in music and/or a Bible College or seminary degree in Bible, Theology, Worship or Pastoral Ministry; willing to pursue further educational training.
- 4. Knowledgeable of church worship music with appropriate practical experience in leading worship with a commitment to excellence.

5. Gifted with musical abilities – vocal, instrumental and directing.

6. Able to oversee and incorporate traditional and contemporary styles of music.

7. Able to communicate effectively and clearly.

- 8. Willing to develop and integrate members into the worship ministry of the church.
- 9. Have technical knowledge and aptitude for audio-visual equipment and software.

10. Passionate about leading people into a relationship with Jesus.

- 11. A creative and strong leader who demonstrates a life of grace and truth.
- 12. A team player who is consistent, trustworthy, and dependable; a servant in attitude and action.

The Pastor of Music and Worship will:

1. Plan and coordinate worship services with the senior pastor having primary responsibility for guiding sermon and worship themes.

2. Write the liturgy for worship services – calls to worship, unison prayers, litanies, etc.

- 3. Coordinate leadership of congregational singing, accompanists, vocalists, instrumentalists, all choirs (chancel, junior, bell & chime), ensembles, praise band(s), and any new music ministries.
- 4. Select music for Sunday morning worship services, seasonal worship services and special services of worship.

5. Assist the pastor(s) in coordinating music for wedding and funerals.

- 6. Have oversight and ultimate responsibility for music ministry activities and programs that involve all age groups, such as:
 - a. Coordinate LOGOS Worship Skills in cooperation with the LOGOS Director

b. Involve people of all ages in offering music during worship

c. Coordinate music ministries within JYF and SYF in cooperation with youth leaders

d. Assist in supplying music for adult gatherings (luncheons, special programs)

- 7. Oversee all dramatic presentations, whether that be worship dramas on any given Sunday, or a Christmas or Easter cantata, or scheduling drama groups like the Covenant Players.
- 8. Recruit, train and support lay leaders and participants in our music and worship ministries.
- 9. Stay informed about materials, resources and methods pertinent to music and worship ministry.
- 10. Manage worship software, including necessary licenses, as well as copyright requirements.
- 11. Meet with staff, committees and church leaders for coordination of music and worship programs.

- 12. Develop the church budget for music and worship ministries, striving to operate these programs within the approved church budget.
- 13. Supervise and resource the technological aspects of worship.
- 14. Coordinate teams of greeters, ushers, worship readers/leaders, song leaders, children's message leaders, audio techs, live stream techs, video techs and presentation techs.
- 15. Be involved in other pastoral and ministerial duties as gifts and time allow.
- 16. In conjunction with any other ministerial staff, assist in covering the duties of the pastor when the pastor is away from the church vacation, conferences, mission experiences, sabbatical, etc.
