PASTOR'S COLUMN

"How beautiful on the mountains are the feet of those who bring good news, who proclaim peace, who bring good tidings, who proclaim salvation, who say to Zion, "Your God reigns!""

Isaiah 52:7

Isaiah 52:7 is a reference to messengers who ran from the scene of a battle to bring news of the outcome to a waiting king and people. There is an example of such a messenger in 2 Samuel 18. Isaiah uses the reference in referring to the return of Israel from exile, returning to Jerusalem. The return from exile speaks to the sovereign rule of God over the world.

Lynne's oncology doctor was the messenger of good news to us, as we met with him for her follow up appointment after surgery. The doctor said, "Lynne is cancer-free." You could hear the joy of such good news in his voice! Lynne and I are blessed, grateful and humbled for the success of her chemo treatment and surgery.

Blessed – that the cancer was detected early, that the cancer was treatable, that treatment occurred locally, that the treatment plan and surgery were so effective, that the months of side effects are over, and that restoration of body, soul and spirit continue.

Grateful – for the healing, for sure, and for the community of believers who prayed for her. She was on the prayer lists of several churches and countless individuals. And we are grateful for God's providence in her life, bringing her through the ordeal.

Humbled – that she is cancer-free. Humbled, because we know not everyone is blessed with such good news, such good results. Humbled because many others experience greater side effects stemming from their treatment. Humbled because many people who have struggled through cancer treatments, either their own or by a family member, were some of the most supportive and encouraging people to talk with us.

Blessed, grateful and humbled – these words speak to the response we each should have of Christ's crucifixion. Christ's willingness to sacrifice himself that we might have life is truly an amazing wonder of healing, healing from the temptations and sinfulness we live with. Set free because of Christ's love and grace.

May we each be messengers of good news, proclaiming peace through the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ.

The Sunday after Mother's Day has traditionally featured the community's ecumenical Burger Bash. This spring, that makes the date Sunday, May 21st serving from 11:00AM to 1:00PM in the Ruihley Park Pavillion. Hopefully you'll come and bring some friends with you to this event, with international reach now nearing a 20-year run!

Enjoy a casual lunch of Brookview's hamburgers or cheeseburgers, accompanied by coleslaw, baked beans, chips and ice cream. The greater Archbold area has a long history of coming together to support this Growing Hope Globally effort. This international program with very local connections helps residents of impoverished areas around the globe improve their living conditions by enhancing their sanitation and farming practices.

You can "eat and run" or hang around to talk with working volunteers who are very involved with the organization. You'll learn that, each year, a pen of calves is raised here with generous donations of feed and human effort for their care. Then when those calves are sold, all the profits go directly to Growing Hope Globally where local cattlemen select the projects closest to their hearts. Traditionally the Burger Bash celebrates the end of one growing year for the calves and kicks off the new one. Consistory Meeting Minutes Highlights – April 17th

- Building Committee Darlene Steiner A team is looking into other elevator options that will not require exterior construction (HMRL). Heat in the floor throughout the building is being reviewed as well. Creighton Electric will be analyzing the electrical capacity. Betsy Redd is working with a group on interior finishes. Final estimate should be provided soon.
- ♦ Fellowship Committee Steve Walker 57 people were served at the Maundy Thursday meal. The next event will be the youth breakfast and senior recognition. The committee has added a couple of new members and is now complete!
- Mission Committee Nancy Rupp The Fish Food Pantry is looking for a new coordinator. Some committee members had a road trip to BSGU for a CRU event. They are looking for ways to increase sponsorship of Kajiado Children's Home children. The committee will be matching the VBS donations to Kajiado Children's Home school. YFC representatives will be here on April 30th.

Building Committee – Renovation Project

Serving on the committee are: Tim Beck, Ryan Christman, Kelly Ducey, Jim Grieser, Betsy Redd, Jeff Rutledge, Dean Sauder, Richard Spiess, Darlene Steiner, Greg Walker, Roger Zimmerman and Pastor Erich.

A recent thermal imaging survey of the radiant floor heating system provided information on the current state of the in floor pipe network. This is part of the homework being done to determine if, and how much, of the current system can be used into the future.

A visit was finally able to be made to a pneumatic operated elevator in the Defiance City School high school, which provides a better visualization and understanding of what the architects are proposing for our project.

The architects are working to finalize a cost summary of the renovation project. Because of the many items needing attention throughout the building, it has been one of their more challenging projects, they've told us recently.

MISSION-A-MONTH: CHERRY STREET MISSION



Cherry Street was founded on Biblical principals in 1947, and remains a Biblically-based, Christ-centered organization today. Their Spiritual Advocates consist of both staff and volunteers that lead Bible studies daily and mentor guests through their journey with Christ. Cherry Street has a Men's Division, Women's Division (Sparrow's Nest) and food services.

Each night, Cherry Street provides safe, free shelter for nearly 230 men and women who would otherwise sleep on the street or remain in an abusive situation. For some, it's the first night they've slept safely in a very long time.

Cherry Street is more than food, clothing and shelter. Their redemptive programming is built around one-on-one discipleship. They care more about who a person is, rather than what a person has become.

Cherry Street is the only organization in the region to offer 3 meals a day, 7 days a week, free of charge to anyone who needs them. Cherry Street gratefully accepts financial donations and gift-in-kind donations (anything donated that is not cash).
